

Defining LBGTQIA2S+

Excerpted from Insti

- (L) **Lesbian:** A person who identifies as a woman and experiences attraction to the same sex and/or gender
- (G) **Gay:** A person who experiences attraction to people of the same sex and/or gender. Gay can include people who identify as either men or women and refer to those who identify as men only.
- (B) **Bisexual:** A person who experiences attraction to both men and women.
- (T) **Transgender**: A person whose gender identity does not correspond with the gender and/or sex assigned at birth.
- (Q) **Queer and/or Questioning:** This term has a history of being used as a derogatory, homophobic, and transphobic slur but has been reclaimed by some LGTBQIA2S+ communities as a term of pride and positivity, and diversity. It is used to encourage a broad spectrum of identities related to sex, gender, and attraction.
- (I) **Intersex**: Refers to individuals for whom chromosomal, hormonal, or anatomical sex characteristics combine in a variety of ways that fall outside of medical and social classifications of male and female.
- (A) **Asexual:** A person who does not experience sexual attraction or has little or no interest in sexual activity.
- (2S) **Two-Spirit**: An English umbrella term to reflect the many words used in different Indigenous languages describing the fluid and diverse

(+) **Plus:** The plus symbol is intended as an all-encompassing representation of sexual orientations and gender identities. This can also include (but is not limited to):

Pansexual: A person who experiences attraction to a diversity of sexes and/or genders.

Demisexual: Often referred to as Demi, this term describes someone who can only experience sexual attraction after an emotional bond has been informed. This bond does not have to be romantic in nature.



How to Wake Up to Music on Your iPhone

Open Clock > Alarm > Plus (+) > Sound. Or, alternately, tap on an existing alarm to update the tune. From there, you can open the iTunes Store app to download a tone, or choose from those saved to your Apple Music library. Don't forget to set the time, when it repeats, and whether you want the option to snooze. Tap Label to give it a name that appears when the alarm rings.

How to Wake Up to Music on Your Android Phone

Open Google Clock > Alarm > Plus (+) > Sound (bell icon). Choose from downloaded tunes, or tap into your YouTube Music, Spotify, or Calm libraries for more options. Google this year updated its Clock app for Pixel devices, making it easier to record and use your own sounds for alarms and timers. Look for a Record new option in the settings; tap to open the Recorder app and capture the noise of your choice.

What is a reverse waterfall?

Next time you feel like defying gravity, consider a trip to Hawaii — specifically the island of Oahu, which is home to a reverse waterfall. Also known as the Upside Down Waterfall, Waipuhia Falls sprays up Mount Konahuanui and can be seen from Route 61 (also known as the Pali Highway). The striking effect, visible only during the wet season between November and March, is a result of the island's strong trade winds. They blow in a northeasterly direction, and catch the water before it can reach the bottom, making it look as though the waterfall flows in reverse.

Though rare, reverse waterfalls do occur elsewhere. Perhaps the most famous is Naneghat, a waterfall in Maharashtra, India, some three hours from Mumbai. It's at its strongest during monsoon season, from June to September. Similar phenomena have also been observed in places as varied as Utah and Sydney, though most of these are one-off events caused by extreme conditions — not that that makes them any less fascinating to watch.

When Dracula simia blooms, a bizarrely striking monkey face materializes. These flowers are indigenous to the cloud forests of Peru and southeastern Ecuador, and there are around 100 varieties within the Dracula genus — so if you're in the area, keep an eye out for little monkey faces peeking out of the greenery.

Fun fact: Monkey orchids smell like oranges.



Look closely at the dove orchid and you'll see what appears to be a delicate bird tucked between its petals (hence the name). The national flower of Panama, the Peristeria elata is often called the flower of the Holy Spirit.

Fun fact: The dove orchid belongs to the orchid species Peristeria, which means dove in Greek.



Native to Japan, Korea, Russia, and China, the white egret orchid is known for its uncanny resemblance to the bird it's named after. With petals that look like outstretched wings, this flower is a showstopper.

Fun fact: A 2022 study found that the white egret evolved "as a stabilizer for the hawkmoth while it pollinates the plant, resulting in better seed production."
