



When Van Gogh Spoke for the Trees

A new exhibition of lesser known works during a pivotal time sheds light on his budding genius

In May of 1889, in the depths of a mental health crisis, Vincent van Gogh retreated to an asylum in Saint-Rémy-de-Provence, in southern France. Here, the artist, who would die by suicide the next year, sought solace in painting. He captured the view through his bedroom window, studied irises in the hospital garden and—when allowed outside the asylum gates—set up his easel in the ancient olive groves that surrounded the village. "There are very beautiful fields of olive trees here, which are grey and silvery in leaf," he wrote to his mother. Van Gogh made the trees the subject of 15 paintings, several of which are on view next month at the Minneapolis Institute of Art. "He was still

experimenting—these were important compositions for him," says Katie Luber, the museum's director, noting the sculptural quality of the painter's brush strokes and his color combinations. "I don't know if I would say that he found peace in the olive groves," she says. "But he found something."

Do Bees Really Die if They Sting YOU?



In a word, no. While some bees undoubtedly do die, others don't.





Knock-knock jokes may have originated in Shakespeare's "Macbeth"

Modern English wouldn't be the same without William Shakespeare. Thanks to the Bard's plays and sonnets, more than 1,700 words have been added to our language. But Shakespeare did more than just spice up the dictionary; he may also have invented one of the world's greatest (or worst) comedy setups — the knock-knock joke. Strangely, the joke isn't found in one of Shakespeare's masterful comedies. Instead, it's embedded within one of his darkest, most intense works.

The beginning of Act 2, Scene 3 of *Macbeth*, after the tortured title character has just killed King Duncan, is known as the "porter scene." It opens with a drunken porter (or gatekeeper) at Macbeth's castle hearing a distant knock, pretending to be the porter of "hell-gate," and saying, "Knock, knock, knock, who's there?" Adding a bit of comic relief, the porter imagines the arrival of a farmer, an equivocator, and a tailor, using the same "knock-knock" construction each time. Although there's none of the eye-rolling wordplay central to the modern knock-knock joke, this is the first known reference to a "knock, knock/who's there" sentence structure in the context of comic relief. Yet it wasn't until the 1930s that the modern knock-knock joke really caught on, as a reassuringly predictable form of comedy during the Great Depression. In other words, across its 400-year history, it seems the knock-



A 1955 Mercedes just nabbed \$143 million at auction, making it the most expensive car ever sold

RM Sotheby's announced it auctioned off a 1955 Mercedes-Benz 300 SLR Uhlenhaut Coupe for 135 million euros, or about \$143 million. The sale smashed the previous record for the most expensive car sold at auction by more than \$95 million and topped the \$70 million record for a car sold privately.

The winning bid was made by British car collector, advisor and dealer Simon Kidston on behalf of an unnamed client. Kidston lobbied the Mercedes-Benz board for 18 months to consider selling the car.

The Mercedes-Benz company owned both of the 300 SLR cars, and the May 5 sale took many collectors by surprise. Mercedes-Benz said it will donate the proceeds to create a fund for scholarships and educational research into the environment and decarbonization.
